LOT 62 - \$1 1923 SILVER CERTIFICATE



Description

The 1923 \$1 Silver Certificate was the last of the large-sized dollar bills issued by the United States [1, 2]. These big banknotes were nicknamed "horse blankets" due to their size compared to the smaller bills we use today [6].

Here's what makes the 1923 \$1 Silver Certificate interesting:

- **Large Size:** Measuring 7.375 inches by 3.125 inches, it dwarfs the dollar bills in your wallet [3, 7].
- **Silver Backing:** These certificates were backed by silver held by the U.S. Treasury. In theory, you could redeem your certificate for a silver dollar at a bank [1, 8]. (This convertibility to silver ended in the 1960s.)
- **Design:** The front features a large portrait of George Washington in the center [2, 6]. The reverse depicts a complex design with an ornate central device, often referred to as the "cogwheel" [8, 9].
- **Limited Mintage:** The large dollar bills were phased out in the 1920s, making the 1923 series one of the last [6].

Value:

The value of a 1923 \$1 Silver Certificate depends on its condition and rarity. Here's a rough idea:

- Circulated notes (that have been spent) can range from \$40 to \$99 depending on condition [2, 3, 4].
- Uncirculated notes (in pristine condition) can be much more valuable, especially for rare varieties [3].
